


Ash Wednesday Soup Supper and Service 4p-6p

Christmas

Around this time of year, I am often bombarded by a wide range of speculation on ‘the true meaning of Christmas.’ This comes in all forms, from conversations overheard at the grocery store, to Facebook posts, and discussions with close friends. These opinions vary widely in subject matter based on their origin, from deeply Christian conversations about keeping Christ in Christmas, to loosely spiritual conversations about spending quality time with family, and even the occasional highly excitable child telling me about Santa. I have often pondered which of these ‘right’ meanings I truly agree with, but in reflection recently I think I have found what Christmas truly means to me, and what it feels like in my soul. I think that, no matter what a person believes in terms of religion, Christmas is one of those few holidays that can have a different meaning to each and every one of us. I would like to share my own discovery with you this evening, as we celebrate here tonight.

Christmas to me is about the silence. People have whole hosts of things they think about when they think of Christmas, but I always imagine the silence. Let me try and explain to you what I mean.

I have been coming here, to the Easton Church of the Brethren, for the Christmas Eve service, every year of my life. This year will make 24 years. Those of you who have attended a Christmas Eve service here before will no doubt recall the tradition that takes place at the very end of the service. Each person is given a handheld candle, and those candles are lit, row by row, person by person. The lights in the sanctuary are then dimmed, and we are left with nothing but candle light to guide us as we sing Silent Night. There are no speakers playing a recording of the melody, and no microphones. Usually we have one guitarist, and the entire experience is based solely on the acoustics of the building. In some ways this is a testament to the plain roots of this church, and its history of no frills, good values, and good people. We would sing, and at the end of the last verse, there was always a moment where the congregation would stand in complete silence for a few seconds before being dismissed. For me it was always that silence that made the most impact.

In that silence, you could hear so much. There were, of course, the sounds of the environment - the cars passing by, the heat in the building cycling on and off, and possibly the sound of cold winds outside if there were any. But there were also the sounds of the people in the congregation. These were not audible sounds, merely thoughts that could be palpably felt in those few silent moments between song and conversation. They were thoughts of family, of children getting home before Santa arrived, of turkeys to be eaten, of presents to be opened. They were hopes and dreams of making memories with family members and loved ones. Wholesome thoughts, those with only good intentions driven by love. The silence was full of joy, of love, and that is the reason I cherished it so much. Very few times in our lives are we allowed to experience joy without sorrow, or love without hurt. In some way, shape, or fashion, there must be a yin to the yang, a counter balance that keeps the universe stable. But on Christmas, I found there was no such balance. On Christmas, pure, wholesome joy was allowed to dominate. And there was nothing in the world to question its purity.

I continued to notice this silence each year as I attended the Christmas Eve church service, and as I have grown I have found this joyous silence in other places in my life. It existed at the top of Machu Picchu in Peru, it exists in the first moments of life after a lamb is pulled from its struggling mother, I've found it time and time again on the back of a horse, and if I'm being honest, I hope to find it one day in the man I decide to marry. But for now, as I take time to grow, heal, and truly find myself, I am spending time looking for the silence. Because in that silence is where we truly find God. I'll be honest with you, no two people have the exact same beliefs, or the same level of connection to God, but I think everyone has found moments in their life where the silence is so deafening that you can feel that connection to something bigger than ourselves. The world is a hustle and bustle of noise and busy schedules, all of which is perfectly fine. There are innumerable joyous moments within that buzz of life, and that is where we spend the majority of our time. However, I challenge you to seek out those silent moments. Stop on the way to your car after leaving a restaurant and look up at the stars. Stand on your porch and listen to the unbelievable silence of a snowstorm. Turn off the tv and the music and just watch the lights on your Christmas tree change colors and allow your mind to wander. You'll be surprised at the things you find in those short moments of silence. You might even find a deeper meaning to Christmas.

CROSS OF ASHES — On Ash Wednesday, as Lent begins, worshipers’ foreheads are often marked with ashes in the sign of the cross. The ashes traditionally come from burning palm branches from the previous Palm Sunday. In the Old Testament, ashes were a sign of mourning and repentance. Today, some worshipers wipe off the ashes before leaving church, to symbolize being cleansed from sin by Jesus’ death; others wear the ashes the rest of the day, carrying the cross of Christ into the world. Reciting Genesis 3:19 often accompanies the placement of ashes: “You are dust, and to dust you shall return.”




